Twinning Visit to Octeville sur Mer

On 26th May 48 Association members arrived in Octeville sur Mer for the start of their bi-annual twinning visit. As the coach unloaded in the Michel Adams Hall car park and the greetings were being made we were told that we must return to the hall at 7pm. for a reception given by the Mayor. So after going to our hosts, dropping off our cases and a quick change of clothes we were back at the appointed time. We were surprised to find a large choir brightly singing English and French songs with an English conductor. After a superb performance it was time for the speeches of welcome, a Champaign aperitif and so the weekend began.

Next day we awoke to heavy rain, but many hosts and visitors braved the elements to visit Octeville's Sunday Market. In the evening we all attended the Soirée and enjoyed a long dinner while being entertained by a Bretagne folk dance group. Then it was time for the diners to join the dancers and after a few dances some very English dances (the conga and oki coki) were shown to our hosts.

Early next morning 91 hosts and visitors boarded two coaches for a visit to the Normandy landing beaches.

The weather worsened with heavy rain and high winds and by the time we arrived at the first stop, Le Point du Hoc, the site of German heavy gun emplacements, conditions were such that most people did not attempt the walk to the headland. Next there was a visit to the gun emplacements at Longue sur Mer and from there onto the pretty village of Crépon for lunch. Following lunch we were taken to the fascinating war museum in Arrormarche, which tells the story of the Mulberry harbour which was initiated by Winston Churchill and was vital to the success of the allied landings. The final stop of the visit was at Pegasus Bridge where the first action of D Day took place where British commanders arrived by gliders and captured the vital bridge over the river Orme and held it against counter attacks until relieved. Unfortunately the severe weather made sight-seeing difficult but the small museum at the site gave good shelter.

All too soon it was Tuesday and time to say farewell to our dear friends and make our way home. In spite of the weather, everyone had had a wonderful time and returned home with happy memories. Vive la Jumelage!
